

## Medical Policy Manual **Approved Rev: Do Not Implement until 4/30/25**

### Cetuximab (Erbix<sup>®</sup>)

#### IMPORTANT REMINDER

We develop Medical Policies to provide guidance to Members and Providers. This Medical Policy relates only to the services or supplies described in it. The existence of a Medical Policy is not an authorization, certification, explanation of benefits or a contract for the service (or supply) that is referenced in the Medical Policy. For a determination of the benefits that a Member is entitled to receive under his or her health plan, the Member's health plan must be reviewed. If there is a conflict between the medical policy and a health plan or government program (e.g., TennCare), the express terms of the health plan or government program will govern.

#### POLICY

#### INDICATIONS

The indications below including FDA-approved indications and compendial uses are considered a covered benefit provided that all the approval criteria are met and the member has no exclusions to the prescribed therapy.

#### FDA-Approved Indications

##### Squamous Cell Carcinoma of the Head and Neck (SCCHN)

Erbix is indicated:

- In combination with radiation therapy for the initial treatment of locally or regionally advanced squamous cell carcinoma of the head and neck (SCCHN).
- In combination with platinum-based therapy with fluorouracil for the first-line treatment of patients with recurrent locoregional disease or metastatic SCCHN.
- As a single agent for the treatment of patients with recurrent or metastatic SCCHN for whom prior platinum-based therapy has failed.

##### K-Ras Wild-type, EGFR-expressing Colorectal Cancer (CRC)

Erbix is indicated for the treatment of K-Ras wild-type, epidermal growth factor receptor (EGFR)-expressing, metastatic colorectal cancer (mCRC) as determined by an FDA-approved test:

- In combination with FOLFIRI (irinotecan, fluorouracil, leucovorin) for first-line treatment
- In combination with irinotecan in patients who are refractory to irinotecan-based chemotherapy
- As a single agent in patients who have failed oxaliplatin- and irinotecan-based chemotherapy or who are intolerant to irinotecan.

#### Limitations of Use:

Erbix is not indicated for treatment of Ras-mutant colorectal cancer or when the results of the Ras mutation tests are unknown.

##### BRAF V600E Mutation-Positive Metastatic Colorectal Cancer (CRC)

Erbix is indicated, in combination with encorafenib, for the treatment of adult patients with metastatic colorectal cancer (CRC) with a BRAF V600E mutation, as detected by an FDA-approved test, after prior therapy.

#### Compendial Uses

- Colorectal cancer
- Squamous cell carcinoma of the head and neck
- Occult primary head and neck cancer



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- Penile cancer
- Squamous cell skin cancer
- Non-small cell lung cancer

All other indications are considered experimental/investigational and not medically necessary.

### DOCUMENTATION

Submission of the following information is necessary to initiate the prior authorization review:

- Documentation of RAS wild-type status or KRAS G12C mutation, where applicable.
- Documentation of BRAF mutation status, where applicable.
- Documentation of EGFR expression, where applicable.

### COVERAGE CRITERIA

#### Colorectal Cancer

Authorization of 6 months may be granted for treatment of colorectal cancer, including appendiceal adenocarcinoma and anal adenocarcinoma, for unresectable/inoperable, advanced, or metastatic disease and the member has not previously experienced clinical failure on panitumumab when either of the following criteria are met:

- The member meets all of the following criteria:
  - The RAS (KRAS and NRAS) mutation status is negative (wild-type)
  - If the tumor is positive for BRAF V600E mutation, the requested medication will be used in combination with encorafenib (Braftovi)
  - For first-line treatment of colon cancer, the tumor is left-sided only; or
- The member meets all of the following criteria:
  - The disease is KRAS G12C mutation positive
  - The requested medication will be used in combination with sotorasib (Lumakras) or adagrasib (Krazati)
  - The member previously received treatment with chemotherapy

#### Squamous Cell Carcinoma of the Head and Neck

Authorization of 6 months may be granted for treatment of squamous cell carcinoma of the head and neck when any of the following criteria is met:

- Disease is locally or regionally advanced, unresectable, recurrent, persistent, or metastatic.
- Member is unfit for surgery.
- The requested medication will be used in combination with radiation.

#### Occult Primary Head and Neck Cancer

Authorization of 6 months may be granted as a single agent for treatment of occult primary head and neck cancer for chemoradiation.

#### Penile Cancer

Authorization of 6 months may be granted as a single agent for subsequent treatment of metastatic / recurrent penile cancer.

#### Squamous Cell Skin Cancer



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Authorization of 6 months may be granted as a single agent **or in combination with carboplatin and paclitaxel** for treatment of squamous cell skin cancer in unresectable/inoperable/incompletely resected, locally advanced, regional, recurrent, or distant metastatic disease.

### Non-Small Cell Lung Cancer (NSCLC)

Authorization of 6 months may be granted for subsequent treatment of recurrent, advanced or metastatic NSCLC when all of the following criteria are met:

- The requested medication will be used in combination with afatinib (Gilotrif).
- The requested medication will be used in members with a known sensitizing EGFR mutation (e.g., EGFR exon 19 deletion or L858R mutation, or EGFR S768I, L861Q, and/or G719X mutation) following disease progression on EGFR tyrosine kinase inhibitor therapy.

### CONTINUATION OF THERAPY

Authorization of 6 months may be granted for continued treatment in members requesting reauthorization for an indication listed in **the coverage criteria** section when there is no evidence of unacceptable toxicity or disease progression while on the current regimen.

### MEDICATION QUANTITY LIMITS

Drug Name	Diagnosis	Maximum Dosing Regimen
Erbix (Cetuximab)	Colorectal Cancer, including Appendiceal Adenocarcinoma and Anal Adenocarcinoma	Route of Administration: Intravenous 500mg/m <sup>2</sup> every 2 weeks  Initial: 400mg/m <sup>2</sup> once Maintenance: 250mg/m <sup>2</sup> every week
Erbix (Cetuximab)	Non-Small Cell Lung Cancer (NSCLC)	Route of Administration: Intravenous 500mg/m <sup>2</sup> every 2 weeks
Erbix (Cetuximab)	Penile Cancer	Route of Administration: Intravenous Initial: 400mg/m <sup>2</sup> once Maintenance: 250mg/m <sup>2</sup> every week
Erbix (Cetuximab)	Squamous Cell Carcinoma of the Head and Neck	Route of Administration: Intravenous 500mg/m <sup>2</sup> every 2 weeks  Initial: 400mg/m <sup>2</sup> once Maintenance: 250mg/m <sup>2</sup> every week
Erbix (Cetuximab)	Squamous Cell Skin Cancer	Route of Administration: Intravenous Initial: 400mg/m <sup>2</sup> once Maintenance: 250mg/m <sup>2</sup> every week
